

Scheduling cont...

Students must add their courses into skyward by using their **STUDENT SKYWARD ACCOUNT**.

Scheduling will not be accessible through the parent's skyward account.

Remember these are <u>requests</u> and do not represent an actual schedule. No grade level or part of the alphabet gets a head start on this process.

Scheduling cont..

- March 1st scheduling requests closes
 **students may still request changes through their school counselor through May 26th.
- May 25th onward schedule changes will only be made based on the policy outlined in course description book.



WHAT IS THE IB DIPLOMA PROGRAM

The International Baccalaureate Diploma Program (IB DP) is a challenging two-year program of courses taken in Grades 11 and 12. The curriculum is provided to Chesterton High School by the International Baccalaureate Organization. (Link to IBO website)

It was a desire for a common "pre-university" curriculum and a common set of exams for students throughout the world that led to the development of the IB diploma program. Created in 1968 at the International School of Geneva, the IB exams administered at Chesterton High School in May of each year are the same exams that are taken by other IB diploma students throughout the world. Today, the International Baccalaureate diploma is accepted by universities around the world, including the best universities in North America, Australia, the UK and continental Europe. The majority of Diploma Program graduates enter higher education.

The IB World Organization currently works with over 3,000 schools in over 140 countries to offer challenging curriculum to more than 970,000 students around the world!

COMPOSITION OF THE DIPLOMA PROGRAM

The curriculum contains six subject groups:

- → Literature (English)
- → Language Acquisition (World Language)
- → Individuals and Societies (History)
- → Math
- → Science
- → The Arts
- → DP Core
 - Creativity, Activity, Service (CAS)
 - ◆ Extended Essay (EE)
 - ◆ Theory of Knowledge (TOK)

CORE

The DP core aims to broaden students educational experience and challenge them to apply their knowledge and skills.

Theory of Knowledge

TOK is assessed through an oral presentation and a 1,600 word essay. It asks students to reflect on the nature of knowledge, and on how we know what we claim to know.

Extended Essay

The extended essay is an independent, self-directed piece of research, finishing with a 4,000-word paper.

Creativity, Activity, Service

CAS enables students to enhance their personal and interpersonal development by learning through experience.

Physical exertion contributing to a healthy lifestyle and positive well-being



Service

Collaborative and reciprocal engagement with the community in response to an authentic need

Knowledge

WHY IB?

The CHS IB Diploma Program creates a <u>camaraderie</u> between students, staff and the Duneland community. The program incorporates academic <u>challenge</u> but is done with a <u>different teaching style</u> in the classroom that

includes **smaller class sizes** and *critical writing instruction*. Students develop and practice the **Learner Profile Characteristics** seen in the image here. CHS diploma students come out of high school with preparation for university competitive college acceptance and in many cases, *college credit*. A student that has earned the CHS IB Diploma will also have satisfied requirements for all three "buckets" of the Indiana Core 40 Diploma. (Link to 10th Grade Information)



Parent Support





Understand IB

Know the IB Abbreviations and pieces of the Diploma Program and ask questions early on in the courses. Stay updated with teacher and coordinator communications



Understand Venting vs. Advice Seeking

If you hear your child starting to rant about how terrible the IB is, ask them whether they would like advice about it or if they just wanted to get something off their chest



Offer Support

Guide your child to focus on their own educational journey and give them space to enjoy the journey. Encourage them to stay organized and check in about upcoming deadlines

HOW TO GET PREPARED

During Freshman & Sophomore years, you need to take and pass

- → English 9 and English 10
- → World Language (French, Spanish, German, Japanese) Levels 1, 2 and/or 3
- → Biology 1 and Chemistry 1/Integrated Chemistry & Physics
- → Algebra I and Geometry
- Geography History of the World or World History
- → It is recommended to have the following completed as well
 - Physical Education
 - ◆ Health
 - Technology Elective
 - Fine Arts Elective
 - Other Electives



Assessment

Registration

Registration Deadline is November 1. In advance of the deadline, the coordinator will register students. Students will be given a form to check and sign to confirm that they have been registered for the correct classes and that their EE is registered in the correct category. If a student fails to complete any part of any exam, does not take the exam, or does not submit/complete IB coursework, the parent(s)/guardian(s) are still responsible for payment of the course(s). **Students must adhere to Academic Integrity of the IBO**

Sitting for Exams

Exams begin in early May and continue for about 3 weeks. At least 2 weeks in advance, students will be given an exam schedule, indicating the time, date, and location of their exams. The school will notify their teachers and attendance of the schedule, but students are encouraged to communicate with their teachers (especially their non - IB teachers) about their time away from class. For any students requiring accommodations, CHS must submit requests to the IB in advance. Exam time is an extraordinarily stressful and exhausting time for IB seniors. While the IB staff will do its best to aid students during this time, parents are asked to help encourage students to get enough sleep, to eat a healthy breakfast, and to help mitigate anxiety during this time

Graduation Protocol

IB Diploma Program candidates, defined as those who are registered as full IB DP candidates in IBIS (taking 6 IB courses and the core (CAS, TOK, and EE), will be seated at the front and separate from the rest of their graduating class. These students must take all exams, complete all IB coursework, and complete the core requirements in order to earn this recognition. These students will be given a white IB stole to wear at graduation. They will be awarded the stoles at senior awards night. These students will be identified in the graduation program as IB Diploma Program candidates. IB certificate candidates who are taking as many IB classes as their schedule allows and who are also registered in IBIS for the core (CAS, TOK, and EE) as a part of their partial program, will be seated at the front and separate from the rest of their graduating class. These students must take all IB exams, complete all IB coursework, and complete the core requirements. They must not have dropped any IB classes. These students will be given a white IB stole to wear at graduation. They will be awarded this stole at senior awards night. These students will be identified in the graduation program as IB Diploma Program certificate students. IB certificate candidates who are taking one or more IB courses and are registered in IBIS as certificate candidates, but who are not registered for the entire core (CAS, TOK, EE) will sit among the rest of the graduating class. These students will be identified in the graduation program as IB certificate candidates.

Award of the IB Diploma



Core Requirement

DP category candidates must study six subjects, plus the three core subjects—EE, TOK and CAS. Accumulate no fewer than 24 points from assessment in these subjects, in addition to grade stipulations. They must meet all of the requirements within a maximum of three examination sessions. Candidates who successfully meet these conditions will be awarded the diploma. Candidates who take the diploma in multiple languages may be eligible for a bilingual diploma.



Additional Requirement

Each subject is graded 1–7, with 7 being the highest grade. Grades are also used as points (that is, 7 points for a grade 7, 6 points for a grade 6...) in determining if the diploma can be awarded. TOK and the EE are graded A–E, with A being the highest grade. These two grades are then combined in the diploma points matrix to contribute between 0 and 3 points to the total. CAS is not assessed but must be completed in order to pass the diploma. The maximum points is <u>45</u>. The minimum scorefor the award of the diploma is 24 points. If a candidate scores less than 24 points or has not met all requirements, the diploma is not awarded.



No IB Diploma Awarded

CAS requirements have not been met. Candidate's total points are fewer than 24. An N (no grade awarded) has been given for TOK, EE or for a contributing subject. A grade E has been awarded for one or both of TOK and the EE. There is a grade 1 awarded in a subject/level. Grade 2 has been awarded three or more times (HL or SL). Grade 3 or below has been awarded four or more times (HL or SL). Candidate has gained fewer than 12 points on HL subjects (for candidates who register for four HL subjects, the three highest grades count). Candidate has gained fewer than 9 points on SL subjects (candidates who register for two SL subjects must gain at least 5 points at SL).



Diploma Candidate

The student's aim is to earn the IB Diploma and undertake the full IB Program. Most DP candidates take one SL exam their first year and the cost of the program is assessed over 2 years




HOW TO SPEAK IB


