
Student performance continues to drive school and district initiatives. Chesterton High School was recently named the Best High School in Northwest Indiana by the NWITimes with the Class of 2023 boasting a 98%+ graduation rate, 40% participating in an award- winning internship and pre-service program, and one out of three graduating seniors completing one year of college while still at CHS.

Student academic achievement at the elementary, intermediate and middle level (K-8) continues to flourish. Duneland students ranked 11th out of all public school districts in the state on Spring 2023 ILEARN English/Language Arts and Math assessments. Jackson Elementary fourth grade students (7th) and Chesterton Middle School 7th grade student (14th) achievement scores were in the Top 20 schools in the state at their respective grade levels.

Our schools add tremendous value to the community and your continued investment and support significantly impacts how we will prepare our students for the future.

DSC STRATEGIC PLAN

In the Spring of 2020, a team of over 50 Duneland School Corporation (DSC) stakeholders helped create a new Strategic Plan for the district. On Monday, June 8, 2020, the DSC Strategic Plan 2020-2023 was approved by the Duneland School Board of Trustees.

The development of the Strategic Plan was a comprehensive process that brought together teachers, students, staff, parents, and community stakeholders for input on the future of Duneland. Five goal areas were developed based on data available within the corporation and from survey results and focus group interviews conducted in the spring of 2020. Collecting feedback from a wide variety of sources was instrumental to the process. The school corporation vision, mission, core values, and goals were redefined and action plans were developed.

The Strategic Plan has provided a transparent roadmap for how the Duneland Schools will prepare students for their individual futures in a constantly changing world. In the fall of 2023, the school corporation will update the plan, to begin in 2024. The development and implementation of the Strategic Plan is a shared commitment with the community. The GVC ensures that students participate in learning that has prioritized standards, engaging curriculum, and aligned assessments. This structure is what guarantees equitable outcomes for all DSC students.

Additionally, teachers have been participating in Professional Learning Communities (PLC). The establishment of PLC time has provided teachers with time to collaborate both vertically and horizontally with their peers to consistently monitor student outcomes. The PLC philosophy is intentionally aligned to support the GVC.

Duneland's Multi-Tiered System of Support provides adequate and equitable tiered support for all students. Our MTSS approach intentionally encompasses the whole child and is aligned with the district mission and vision.

This year we implemented the Branching Minds platform in grades K-8 to organize and analyze student data to identify student needs and facilitate the implementation of targeted interventions. The high school is developing a system to gather information for student insight cards to highlight a student's interests, skills, mentor and career goals that can be used to further college and career pursuits. We also expanded our crisis prevention training (CPI) which has helped staff become more proactive in preventing disruptive behavior and responding to students in crisis.

As we enter the 2023-2024 academic year, the Duneland School Corporation is making strides committing to the main tenet of our vision: "Supporting all students through the development of the whole child." DSC is proud to welcome all Exceptional Learning teachers to the staff as one family. As a whole, the Duneland community is committed to adopting a more inclusive atmosphere in which we can "inspire excellence, ignite curiosity and unlock potential for all." We look forward with anticipation to growing our capacity to serve. One aspect to improving support and services has been Duneland's addition of Exceptional Learning Coordinators to the team. We will have three Exceptional Learning Coordinators who will be based at each instructional level who will also work collaboratively to support the needs of the district. They will provide guidance and coaching to staff, address special education needs within buildings, assist the director and be a presence in some case conferences. We look forward to the variety of perspectives and expertise that they will bring to Duneland in their new roles. We thank the community for their tremendous support as we work to provide equitable experiences to all learners.

The Department of Teaching & Learning is ensuring that a solid foundation is set early on and then that foundation is built upon each year thereafter, providing students with a rigorous education K-12.


TROJAN LEARNING CENTER EARLY LEARNING OPPORTUNITIES



As a result of the strategic plan, based on research and findings during the strategic planning process, DSC recognized that learning begins at birth and early learning is critical to the future success for children. As a result, a Birth-to-School initiative was identified as a priority and an action team was created.

In January of 2022, DSC introduced the first early learning program, the Duneland Early Learning HUB to the community. Housed in the Trojan Learning Center (TLC), the HUB is a place for caregivers and their children to learn, play and grow together. The term HUB refers to the program's vision to Help, Understand and Build connections and relationships between families, educators, and the community. It's the hub of resources for Duneland's 0 to 5 year old children and their caregivers.

DSC's Early Learning HUB is a free program to all Duneland families with young children from prenatal to kindergarten entry. While not a preschool where families drop their children off for child care, it is a place for caregivers and their children to learn while playing together. The HUB provides young Trojans and their families with activities, resources and educational opportunities for children and caregivers.





During the 2022-2023 school year, the HUB was proud to have approximately 170 families with over 200 children enrolled, and also welcomed almost 60 professional hosts, visitors, volunteers and community guests. These individuals presented and discussed a variety of topics during the Play and Learn Sessions, Trojan Tykes and Trojans Together. The HUB also served as a location for Chesterton High School's internship program.











The Duneland School Corporation's Birth-to-School and Early Learning initiative continues to grow. In August 2023, DSC's Developmental Preschool and Speech will move into the TLC. The developmental preschool classrooms shall meet the needs of 3 - 5 year old students (not yet enrolled in Kdg) with an Individual Education Plan (IEP). In addition, DSC is excited to welcome the Duneland YMCA Half-Day Preschool to the TLC. Duneland Schools has partnered with Duneland Y Preschool to offer learning for our youngest and future Chesterton Trojans. The Duneland Y will offer half-day preschool for a fee to registered families.

These early learning opportunities, now housed under one roof, should provide the ultimate social, academic and learning environment while celebrating positive peer interactions. All these early learning initiatives will help children get students ready for kindergarten by focusing on foundational skills, self help skills, and social skills.

LONG-TERM CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS

In 2021, the Duneland School Corporation began planning for large-scale capital improvements across the district. Construction began in 2022 and is expected to be completed during the 2024-25 school year.

- New construction at Yost Elementary School
- Renovations at four elementary schools Bailly, Brummitt, Jackson, Liberty
- Renovations and new additions at two intermediate/middle schools Liberty and Westchester

When completed, all K-8 schools will have updated mechanical, electrical, and plumbing infrastructure and safety and security enhancements that will provide a modern learning environment for students.







The long-term capital improvements currently underway have not increased the school corporation tax rate. This is due to debt from the construction of Chesterton High School (1999) being replaced by the current construction that will provide 20-year facility solutions at all K-8 schools.




When compared with the state average and local districts with comparable communities and programming for students, the Duneland School Corporation continues to provide a tremendous return on investment for taxpayers.



SCHOOL FINANCE

The Duneland School Corporation receives funding to operate schools from two primary sources: tuition support from the State of Indiana and local property taxes.




STATE TUITION SUPPORT

In the Spring of 2023, the Indiana State Legislature approved a 2-year budget that allocated 47% of all state dollars to K-12 public education. This budget has been championed by many as the most money ever given to public schools. While this is technically true, this is a 6% decrease from the previous budget in (2021) allocated 50% of all state dollars to K-12 public education.


EDUCATION FUND

The Education Fund makes-up 46% of the entire school corporation budget and is used to fund educational programs, classroom expenditures, and teacher and building-level support staff salaries. The State of Indiana will provide the Duneland School Corporation with an approximately 5.5% increase in 2024 and an approximately 1.4% in 2025 from the previous two-year budget. The increase will not keep up with 10-11% inflation we have seen over the past couple of years, much less allow for salary increases for teachers and staff.




PROPERTY TAX SUPPORT

The amount of property taxes school corporations can levy for non-academic operations, maintenance, transportation, and capital improvement programs is determined by the State-mandated maximum levy growth quotient and reduced by the circuit breaker, which limits taxpayer liability to a fixed percentage (1% for residential, 2% rental and 3% business/commercial) of the value of their property. Duneland taxpayers likely noticed an increase to their tax bill this Spring. This is due to property values increasing. As depicted in the chart on page 7, Duneland School Corporation has committed to keeping the total property tax rate for residents flat.



DEBT SERVICE FUND

The debt service fund makes-up 13% of the school corporation budget and is used to finance capital improvements throughout the district. In 2021, the school corporation replaced the debt from the CHS new construction in 1999 with safety, security, modernization, and improvement projects at all K-8 schools. The financing for these projects did not raise the tax rate and will provide students with safe and modern learning environments for the next 20 years.



OPERATIONS FUND

The operations fund makes up 30% of the school corporation budget and is used for maintenance, transportation and all staff (bus drivers, custodians, maintenance, central administrative services). In 2023-24, Duneland Schools will employ over 800 total staff members in support of over 5,800 students.




OPERATING REFERENDUM FUND

Due to the lack of financial support from the State of Indiana, the Duneland Community has supported the school corporation with a twenty-two cents (\$0.22) tax levy originally approved in 2012, and continued in 2019, for the purpose of maintaining the current educational and operational programs in the school corporation. This general

operating fund referendum makes-up 11% of the district budget and will be considered for renewal in 2026.





Purple Star Recognition

All of the Duneland Schools have been designated as Purple Star schools by the Indiana Department of Education (IDOE) for their significant display of commitment to service members, veterans, students and families connected to our nation's military.

2023-2024 Family Friendly Schools

All of the Duneland Schools earned the initial designation of Family Friendly School from the IDOE in 2022 and each school continues to meet the Progressing criteria yearly. This state program recognizes schools that excel in involving families and communities in the educational process. The purpose of the program is to focus on addressing the academic, physical, emotional, and social needs of students while providing the needed resources and fostering the active involvement of their families through schools and the community.

National Merit Scholarship Program

Three CHS seniors, Giovanni DePasquale, Riley Hawksworth and Bridget Raffin, were named National Merit Scholarship Semifinalists and all three advanced to finalists in the Spring 2023. Each of the finalists received a college-sponsored merit scholarship to the college/university of their choice. In addition, three CHS seniors, Saanya Agarwal, Ian Condes and Connor Engels, were named Commended Students in the 2023 National Merit Scholarship Program.

2022 College Success Award

CHS was one of 81 public schools in Indiana to earn a College Success Award in 2022 based on their success preparing students for college.

Chesterton Senior High School is a 2022 Best High School, based on rankings that U.S. News & World Report published in April.

2023 Best Public High School in Region

Chesterton High School was voted the 'Best Public High School of the Region' in The Times Best of Region 2023 Competition.

Teacher of the Year - Top 25 Finalist

Duneland School Corporation Elementary Teacher of the Year, Rebecca Holmen, was selected as a 2023 Indiana Teacher of the Year (INTOY) Top 25 Finalist.

Class of 2024 Rising Stars

Four CHS juniors, Jai Barath, Julia Dietrich, Ella Keane and Sophia Zhang, were recognized as Class of 2024 Rising Stars of Indiana as part of the Indiana Association of School Principals (IASP) recognition program.

Indiana Academic All-Star

lan Condes was one of 40 seniors from throughout Indiana to be selected in the 2023 Indiana Academic All-Stars, a program of the Indiana Association of School Principals (IASP). He was selected from a field of 280 outstanding nominees from the state's private and public accredited schools. Academic All-Star distinction recognizes seniors who excel in the classroom first and foremost, but who also are actively involved in their schools and communities, and take on leadership roles in those activities.

Project Lead the Way (PLTW) Distinguished Schools

Liberty Elementary, Yost Elementary and Westchester Intermediate earned the PLTW Distinguished Program recognition for 2022-2023. PLTW's recognition program celebrates districts and schools committed to helping students unlock their potential and own their education by increasing student access, engagement, and achievement in their PLTW programs.

Duneland Robotics Teams Advance to State Competition

Duneland Robotics concluded its season with the State Championship at Lucas Oil Stadium in Indianapolis. Competing were 12 DSC teams from Brummitt, Liberty Intermediate, Westchester Intermediate and Chesterton Middle School. The Brummitt Elementary GLAM Techs made the finals at the elementary level. The DSC Robotics program has over 200 students participating from 61 teams throughout the district.

Trojan Guard Marching Band

CHS Trojan Guard marching band earned a 4th place finish in the 2022 Indiana State School Music Association Scholastic Finals competition. Coming off a first place Prelims performance the previous week, the Trojan Guard had their best run of the season. This placement matches last season's fourth place standing, the highest placement in six years. The Trojan Guard's final score was also exemplary, the highest point total the band has received in the past 19 seasons.

CHS Music Receives ISSMA All-Music Total Department Award

The Band, Choir, and Orchestra received the Indiana State School Music Association (ISSMA) All-Music Total Department Award. This State-level honor is given when music educators offer well-rounded music programs, and design performances that allow the students to get well-rounded music educations. While the individual Band, Choir, or Orchestra have won this award as recently as last year, it takes extra qualifications to receive the Total Department award. CHS is one of 19 high schools in the State to receive this award.

National Honor Band, All-State Honors Band & Orchestra

Three CHS band students, Brayden Gray, Ellen Rath and Bridget Wisdom were selected to perform in the 2023 Indiana Bandmasters Association All-State Honor Bands to represent Chesterton as three of the top student musicians in the state, and Wisdom was even honored to lead her section as First Chair. Most impressively, Wisdom was also acknowledged as one of the best high school musicians in the country by earning a spot in the most prestigious National honor ensemble, the Honor Band of America. In addition, CMS 8th grade orchestra student, Sam Smith, was selected to perform in the 2023 Junior All-State Honors Orchestra.

CHS Show Choirs

CHS Show Choirs had a record-breaking season in 2023. It was 2018 the last time they earned a Grand Championship, and this year the Sandpipers & their band, The Business, ended the season as 3-time Grand Champions and 2-time First Runner-Ups. The Drifters also did exceptionally well, as they were 2-time Champions of their Division, as well as 2-time Division First Runner-Ups and 1-time Division Second Runner Up. This means that the lowest any group placed the entire season was third. The Business also earned the Best Band award at every competition they attended.

Celebrating 50 Years of Madrigal & All That Jazz

Chesterton Music was honored to host the 50th Anniversary Madrigal Dinners this past December, adding an extra performance to meet the demand for tickets. Faculty and performers created commemorative mugs and hosted a reunion sing-along with past choral directors. This past year also

marked the 50th Opus of All That Jazz, where middle and high school jazz musicians learn from and perform with the multi-Grammy award-winning professionals.

Speech and Debate Recognition

CHS Speech and Debate students competed at more than 30 tournaments this year, claiming more than 60 individual first place championships in their respective events. Chesterton finished its season ranked among the top 40 teams in the National Speech and Debate Association.

Speech State Championship in Original Performance

CHS seniors Jackson Dudek and Joshua Hoover won the state championship in Original Performance. As per the rules of the event, they wrote their own material which was titled "the Speech'nanator" which heartwarmingly spoofed Speech and Debate 'terminator style.' The boys have since had their work officially published.

Debate State Championship in Public Forum

CHS seniors Zander Fish and Saanya Agarwal won the state championship in Public Forum. Fish and Agarwal defeated Fisher's competitors by a 4-1 judges decision in the final round. They represented the negative position on the resolution that "The United States Federal Government should increase its diplomatic effort to peacefully resolve internal armed conflicts in West Asia." Fish and Agarwal are CHS's 2nd consecutive and 7th Public Forum state champion since the event's creation in 2004.

Speech & Debate State Teams Place as Runners-Up

The Chesterton High School Debate team finished their Indiana season in third place at the ISSDA tournament. The Speech team came in as the third place finisher in the AA division at the ISSDA tournament.

Student finishes career in the top 1% of the nation

Senior Gigi Hanner amassed more than 2,000 competition points over the course of her four years in the Speech & Debate program.

Speech student Top 12 in Nation at NCFL Grand National Tournament

Addie Botts, a junior, was a semifinalist at the NCFL Grand National Tournament in Louisville that placed her in the top 12 in the nation in the combined event of Dramatic and Humorous Interpretation.

Japanese Olympiad Team Wins State Championship

The CHS Japanese Olympiad team won the state championship in the third-year division and placed second in the fourth-year division at the Japanese Olympiad of Indiana at Indiana University in Bloomington. CHS has won the Japan Bowl/Japanese Olympiad state championship 22 times along with three national Japan Bowl championships and one national runner-up.

Boys DAC All-Sports Trophy

The Boys placed first in the Duneland Athletic Conference (DAC) standings for the 2022-2023 school year. The boys last won the all-sports standings in 2019-20 and 2017-2018. The Girls placed third in 2022-23 and last won in 2012-13.

Boys & Girls Soccer Teams

The CHS Boys & Girls Soccer Teams were both co-DAC Champions.

Boys Cross Country Team

The CHS Boys Cross Country team were DAC runners-up, Semi-State Champions and competed in the IHSAA State Cross Country Meet where they finished in the Top 10 with ninth place finish.

Boys & Girls Swimming and Diving Teams

The CHS Boys Swimming and Diving team had a successful season that included another DAC Championship along with an IHSAA Sectional Championship. The season culminated in a 10th place finish at the IHSAA State Finals this year. The Girls Swimming team won the DAC and IHSAA Sectional Tournaments and finished 14th at the State Finals.

CHS Boys Track & Field Team

The Boys Track & Field team had a successful season which wrapped up in 2nd place finish for the DAC as well as an IHSAA Sectional Championship at Portage. The team also competed at the IHSAA State Finals.

CHS Bovs & Girls Tennis

Both the CHS Boys and Girls Tennis teams won the DAC and IHSAA Sectionals.

CHS Dance Team Club

The CHS Dance Team Club finished its second full season with many accomplishments at the Regional, State and National level. The CHS competitive dance team placed as Runner-up in the AAA Kick regional and state finals. At State competition, the Jr. Ensemble won the Championship title and the Small Ensemble placed as Runner-Up. Individually, there were several state finalists including a Runner-Up finish by Junior Level Soloist Vanessa Vega; and a 4th and 10th place finish by Senior Level Soloists Olyvia Clark and Adele Megaro, respectively. At Nationals, the team placed 4th in Medium Varsity Kick and 8th in Media Varsity Team Performance.

CHS Boys Basketball

The CHS Boys Basketball Team had an outstanding season that resulted in another DAC and IHSAA Sectional Championship. In addition to the team success, two team members, Tyler Parrish and Justin Sims, were selected to the DAC All-Conference Team and Indiana Basketball Coach's Association Junior All-Stars.

CHS Wrestling

Three CHS Wrestlers qualified for the IHSAA State Finals. Senior Aiden Torres had an undefeated season and won the state championship at 145 lbs. Isaiah Wilson qualified in the 120 pound weight class by finishing in fourth place at Semi-State and Ben Shaffer punched his ticket in the 160 pound weight class by finishing in third place at Semi-State.

CHS Boys Golf Team

Boys Golf team advanced to the state meet with a third place finish at the Sandy Pines Regional by shooting a 320. The team had a 15th place finish at State.
